





FAITH is based on team building, showing how men all need each other. Laptops are available and coding is taught along with other basic computer classes. There is a cooking club as well, although the kitchen is currently under construction. Mr. Carter has introduced meditation and saltwater foot soaks to relieve stress and encourage self-care. He also hopes to have a media room to begin a podcast and become a space to record various genres of music (e.g. spoken word, rap, etc). During fatherhood support meetings, they discuss parental stressors such as "How to Cope as a Father." These sessions are scheduled from one to two hours each week. FAITH also has a therapeutic punching bag and exercise room. Older men are invited into younger men's groups to encourage mentorship and "bridging the generation gap."


